Dear Rocketship community,

Our nation is now five years removed from the onset of the pandemic. Learning loss remains persistent and pervasive across our country. The achievement gap between socioeconomically disadvantaged students and their more privileged peers is growing again. And a majority of students in our nation are not on the college and career-ready path. **But this is not the story of our year at Rocketship Public Schools. I am especially proud of the gains we made in the 2024-25 school year and that, as a collective community, we continue to bounce back strong.**

Our Rocketeers took a major step forward in our academic recovery last year. In both math and reading, we saw our largest improvement since 2020. Our “gap-busting” model, as named by [Stanford’s 2023 CREDO study](#), is turning the tide of learning loss and we are closing in on our pre-pandemic performance levels.

Navigating our way towards full academic recovery hasn’t been easy. We have simultaneously been managing a multi-year process to implement new curricula across all schools in our network. The complexity of managing change on top of change has stretched and challenged us—and we are stronger for it. We have sharpened our personalized learning model through more responsive and data-driven student groupings.

We have refined our talent development program to better meet the needs of the evolving art of teaching. And we have expanded our best-in-class approach to family engagement to help families overcome a new wave of barriers to attendance and engagement at school.

Change is constant and we are continuing to learn and innovate new ways to further elevate our Rocketeers’ achievement and expand our impact. But one thing hasn’t changed: our unwavering belief in the promise of public charter schools as a vital force in restoring our nation’s excellence in public education. An excellent public education system is the bedrock of the American promise of equal opportunity and Rocketship’s vision of “equal access to opportunity for all” has never been more relevant or more urgent. Thank you for your support of our community, your belief in our Rocketeers, and your commitment to ensure that every child in our nation is given the opportunity to dream, to discover, and to unleash their incredible potential.

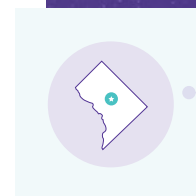
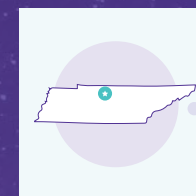
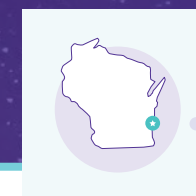
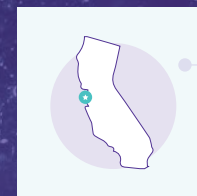
Our Vision:

Second, we build **community power** by equipping families to champion their children's education, hold leaders accountable, and strengthen the public school systems their communities rely on. Finally, we pursue **scaled impact** by exploring innovative ways to deepen and extend our reach—so what works for our students can benefit many more across the regions we serve today and will serve in the future.

Together, these levers ensure that access to opportunity is not just promised, but realized for every Rocketeer, family, and community we have the privilege to serve.

What began 18 years ago in a San Jose church with 160 Rocketeers is now a national movement.

Today, we serve more than 10,000 students each year across 22 schools in four regions and have reached more than 33,000 since our founding. From California to Washington, D.C., our Rocketeers are excelling in college, working in state capitols and high-tech labs, and advocating for their communities. Our educators are pioneering new levels of innovation in the classroom, and parents are raising their voices for educational equity and excellence.

Gap-Closing Growth

Our Rocketeers gain more than a year’s worth of academic learning in a single school year. This is how we narrow and ultimately eliminate the achievement gap that has limited access to opportunity for far too long.



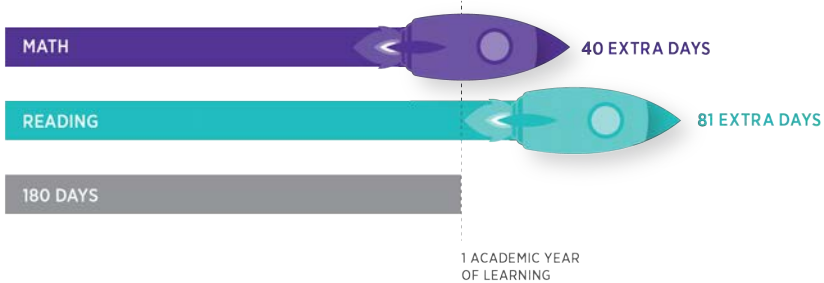
Big Gains. Real Progress.

- In the 2024-25 school year, our Rocketeers gained the equivalent of:
- 81 additional days of learning in reading
 - 40 additional days of learning in math
- These gains do not reflect any additional days in school.

How We Do It:

A proven model of personalized learning—for students and teachers—propels *all* of our learners. A 2023 Stanford CREDO study identified Rocketship as a national “gap-busting” network, finding that Rocketeers gained the equivalent of five to seven additional months of learning in a single school year. This independent research affirms what we see every day: when instruction is personalized and families are true partners, students accelerate far beyond typical growth.

NWEA, the Northwest Evaluation Association, and its nationally-normed MAP assessment evaluates more than 13 million students annually across more than 35,000 schools and 146 countries. The MAP assessment measures how well students are learning and growing in core subjects. Rocketship students take the MAP assessment in the fall, winter, and spring to evaluate student progress and inform our personalized learning model.

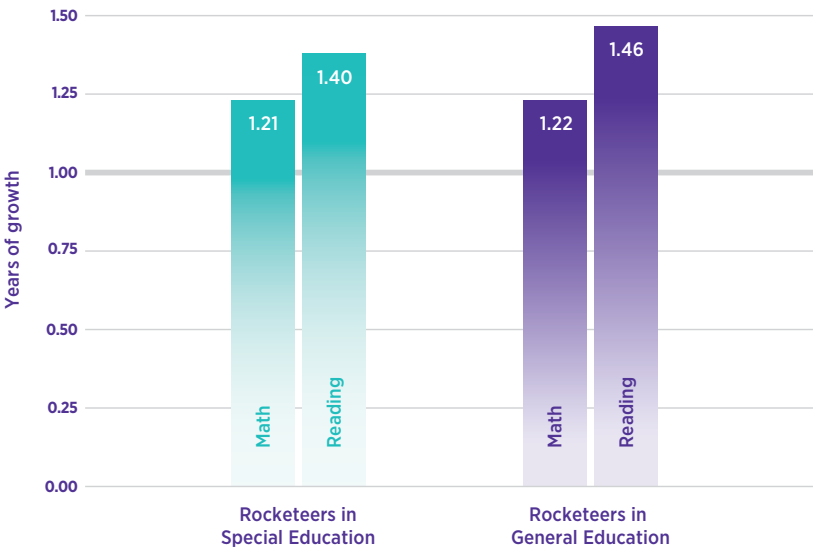


2024-25 Student Growth on NWEA MAP

Personalized Learning Ensures Students with Special Needs Soar

In many public schools, students with special needs spend most of the day separated from their peers. At Rocketship, we do the opposite.

Meaningful inclusion is our model.

Rocketeers with learning disabilities spend at least half their day in general education classrooms. The vast majority spend over 80% of their time learning alongside peers.

Our inclusive approach gives every student access to the same high-quality instruction as their peers—while also providing individual supports like small-group co-teaching and one-on-one instruction.

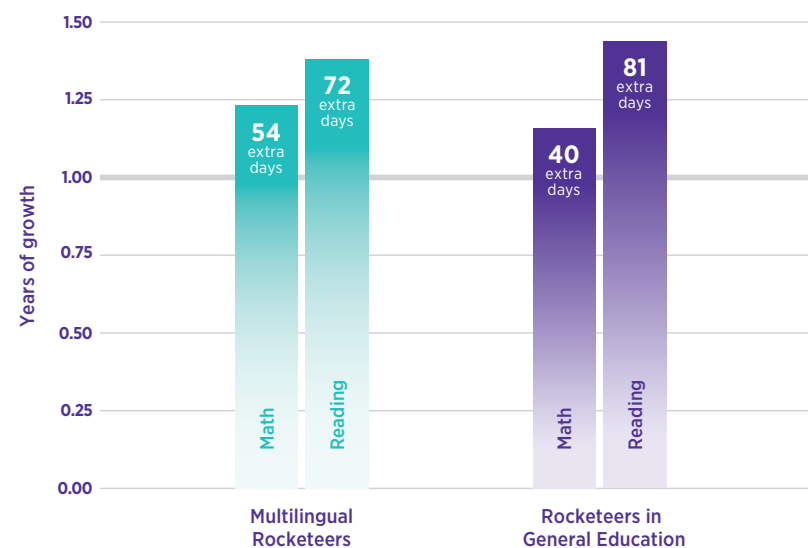
Last year, Rocketeers with special education needs achieved strong growth and narrowed gaps with general education peers at Rocketship—proof that personalized learning and meaningful inclusion help every child thrive academically and socially.

Multilingual Rocketeers Keep Pace with General Education Peers

Across our network, Rocketeers speak more than 50 languages at home. Our personalized approach ensures our Rocketeers are able to access their learning and we meet them where they are.

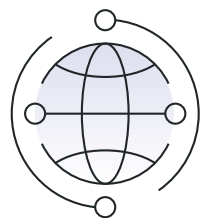
Whether you come to the classroom as a fluent English speaker or a child looking to build English proficiency, your needs are met at Rocketship and you are set up to succeed academically. Consequently, our multilingual Rocketeers are experiencing record growth and, in some cases, even exceeding their peers in academic achievement.

Across the network, multilingual Rocketeers averaged 1.3 years of growth on NWEA in math and 1.4 years in English language arts. In Washington DC and Wisconsin, our multilingual learners soared with 1.5 years of growth!

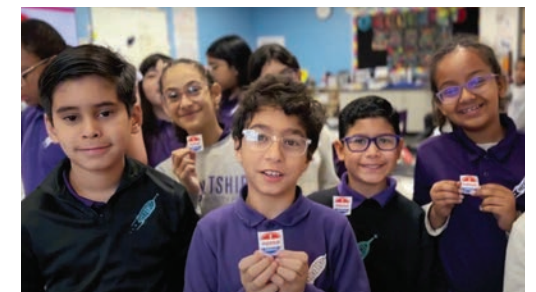

More Than a School: A Community of Support for Every Rocketeer

At Rocketship, we know that students thrive when their needs are met both inside and outside the classroom. That’s why we take a holistic, community schools approach—building deep partnerships with local organizations to ensure every Rocketeer has access to the wraparound supports they need to learn, grow, and flourish.

Through these partnerships, families receive critical resources related to food security, housing stability, clothing, health services, and employment. By surrounding our students and families with a strong network of support, we create the conditions for them to unleash their full potential in all areas of their lives.

Our vision is to scale this community schools model across the entire Rocketship network. After a successful pilot in California and a promising replication in Wisconsin, we are now laying the groundwork to expand this approach to additional regions. With continued philanthropic investment and expanded public funding, we can bring these transformative supports to even more Rocketeers and families in the years ahead.



Connecting with Families Beyond the Classroom

Our approach to personalized learning is focused on building deep relationships with our Rocketeers and their families—their first teachers. At Rocketship, this starts with our annual home visits.

This annual practice enables our educators to learn about their students’ home environments, family structures, unique interests, why they chose Rocketship, and to develop deeper relationships with parents. By creating multiple opportunities for families to engage throughout the year, we’re able to support Rocketeers holistically and connect with families authentically.

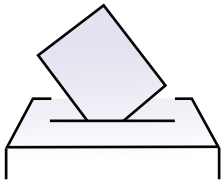

We are proud to champion civic engagement as part of our vision to create equal access to opportunity for all. Research shows that when parents are more engaged in their school communities, their children achieve more academically, reinforcing our vision of equal access to opportunity for all. Consequently, during the 2024 election, we ran our Rocketship Votes campaign across our national network of public schools—leveraging the trust we’ve built with thousands of families to help them understand the power of their voices and votes. Over three months, our Rocketship Votes Fellows dedicated more than 900 hours to organizing school events, canvassing families, engaging staff, and hosting student elections—all to inspire voter registration and participation.

We also focused on educating our Rocketeers about democracy and the value of their voice. From curriculum units on voting to student council elections, our students learned firsthand about the importance of participating in their communities. Together, we are creating a culture of civic engagement that unleashes the potential of our families and communities today and tomorrow.

From Lead Lunch Server to Top Tier Teacher: Rocketship Propels Careers

Thirteen years ago, Ericka Ramirez proudly began her journey at Rocketship Mosaic as a lead lunch server. She cherished the daily moments of greeting students, encouraging them, and being part of their school day, but felt a calling to step into the classroom and shape her students' learning as well as their lives. With encouragement from her school community, she went back to school herself, determined to become a teacher.



Her path forward was powered by Rocketship's commitment to professional growth. Ericka became an Individualized Learning Specialist supporting 3rd graders, and was later promoted to Learning Lab Lead,

where she spent seven years supporting Rocketeers through small-group and individualized instruction. Along the way, she received consistent coaching and mentorship by her principal.

"My school leader taught me so many ways to manage my classroom and believe in my potential as a teacher," Ericka recalls. That guidance—and relentless dedication—helped her develop the strong classroom management skills and deep sense of purpose she carries today.

Now in her third year as a first grade STEM teacher, Ericka is recognized for her vibrant classroom and unwavering belief in her students. Her journey is proof that with determination, support, and opportunity, dreams take flight at Rocketship.

Building New Pathways to The Classroom

Schools across the country are facing a persistent teacher shortage driven by a shrinking pipeline of new teachers entering the profession. The impact is felt most acutely in disadvantaged communities where staffing instability can disrupt learning and limit access to consistent, high-quality instruction.

Addressing this challenge requires more than short-term fixes. We must invest in new, accessible pathways into the teaching profession—pathways that reduce financial and credentialing barriers, provide high-quality training and mentorship, and support educators to grow and stay in the classroom. By strengthening the teacher pipeline, we can ensure that every student has a well-prepared, supported teacher and that our schools remain places where educators can build sustainable, impactful careers.



At Rocketship, we are responding to the national teacher shortage by investing deeply in the development of educators across our network. We are building clear, accessible pathways that prepare, support, and retain great teachers.

Through our Teacher Residency with Loyola Marymount University, aspiring educators earn their credential in one year with intensive coaching and hands-on experience. Our Rising Leader program creates a strong pipeline for high-performing teachers to grow into school leadership. And through our partnership with Rivet School, staff can pursue degrees and enter the classroom. Together, these intentional investments strengthen the teacher pipeline while ensuring our educators have clear opportunities for career growth and economic mobility.

Improving the Public Education Ecosystem

By focusing exclusively on elementary education, we work to improve the entire ecosystem of public education in the communities we serve. We are not creating a parallel K-12 school system, we are focused on improving outcomes for kids and deepening engagement with parents at the elementary level.

Our expertise in elementary education prepares thousands of Rocketeers in their vital early years of education. Our graduates are prepared for middle school. In fact, a [three-year study by SRI Education](#) found that our Rocketeers are a full year ahead of their middle school classmates in both math and reading. That academic head start translates directly into middle schools enrolling more students who are on grade level and ready for more advanced content.

We not only prepare students academically for middle school but also partner with our parents to ensure a smooth transition. During their time at Rocketship, our parents are deeply engaged in their Rocketeers' education. They become champions of their child's learning and harness their voice to advocate for their communities. Additionally, **families participate in middle school fairs and get connected to schools with high success rates.** They also learn to hold leaders accountable and ensure their kids continue to receive the same excellence in education that they experienced during their elementary years at Rocketship.

Why it Matters

Excellent elementary schools beget stronger middle schools beget stronger high schools.

It's a virtuous cycle designed to scale impact far beyond the number of seats offered at Rocketship. This is how our elementary-only model is designed to elevate the entire public education ecosystem in the communities we serve.

Innovation at the Core of Rocketship

At Rocketship, innovation has never been a trend—it has always been our foundation. From the beginning, we reimagined the traditional classroom to create our rotational learning model. We've led the way in designing schools that unleash every child's potential. For us, innovation is not about chasing what's new, but about continuously refining and expanding what works—always pushing the boundaries of what education can look like.



Our personalized learning model was born from this ethos: an intentional blend of specialized instruction, enrichment, tutoring, technology, and dynamic learning environments that give every Rocketeer the chance to thrive. Today, as new tools like generative AI emerge, we see them not as novelties, but as the next evolution of our personalized learning model. By piloting intelligent tutoring, leveraging predictive data systems, and exploring new platforms, we ensure that educators gain more time for deeper engagement and critical thinking, while our Rocketeers receive even more personalized pathways to mastery.

At Rocketship, innovation is like sharpening the pencils of the future—always keeping our tools ready so every child can write their own story of success. It's about making sure every child has access to the future of education today. Because when Rocketeers soar, the world rises with them.

Reflection: Learning From Our Experience in Texas

In public education, leadership is often measured by ambition—the drive to tackle inequity at scale, open more schools, and serve more students and families. At Rocketship, we have learned that true leadership also requires the discipline to slow down, reflect honestly, and acknowledge when we fall short of our own standards.

Our experience in Fort Worth, Texas, was one of those moments.

This year, Rocketship made the difficult and thoughtful decision to separate from Rocketship Texas. When we launched our work in Fort Worth five years ago, we were inspired by a coalition of local leaders who believed deeply in the promise of Rocketship’s elementary model. Their commitment—and the parent-led movement that followed—sparked meaningful momentum for educational equity in the Stop Six community, a legacy that will continue beyond our presence.

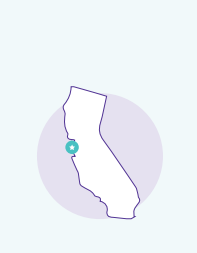
As we reflect on this chapter, we also recognize that Texas operated under a governance structure unlike any other region in our network. Rocketship Texas functioned as a wholly independent organization—essentially a licensee of the Rocketship model and brand—without the shared governance and oversight that connect our other regions as one aligned network. That structural difference had ripple effects: it slowed decision-making, created misalignment, weakened execution, and limited our ability to intervene effectively during moments of challenge.

This experience reinforced a critical lesson: consistent governance is essential to quality, coherence, and mission alignment. In every other region, our governance model creates a strong partnership between regional boards and our national board—balancing local context and expertise with network-wide expertise and strategic direction. This structure enables timely decision-making, supports continuous improvement, and safeguards the integrity of our academic and operational model while remaining responsive to community needs.

In Texas, we stepped away from that approach—and we learned from it. Going forward, consistent governance across regions is central to our strategy to grow with the quality our Rocketeers and communities deserve. This clarity strengthens our ability to make disciplined expansion decisions and to protect what makes Rocketship schools successful.

While Rocketship no longer operates in Texas, we remain proud of the families, educators, and community leaders who built a movement for educational excellence in Fort Worth, and we are deeply grateful for the trust they placed in us. The lessons from Texas have strengthened our network and reaffirmed our commitment to expanding only where we can ensure high-quality execution and long-term sustainability. As we continue to grow in California, Wisconsin, Tennessee, Washington, D.C., and beyond, we are better prepared than ever to deliver transformative outcomes for our Rocketeers and their families.



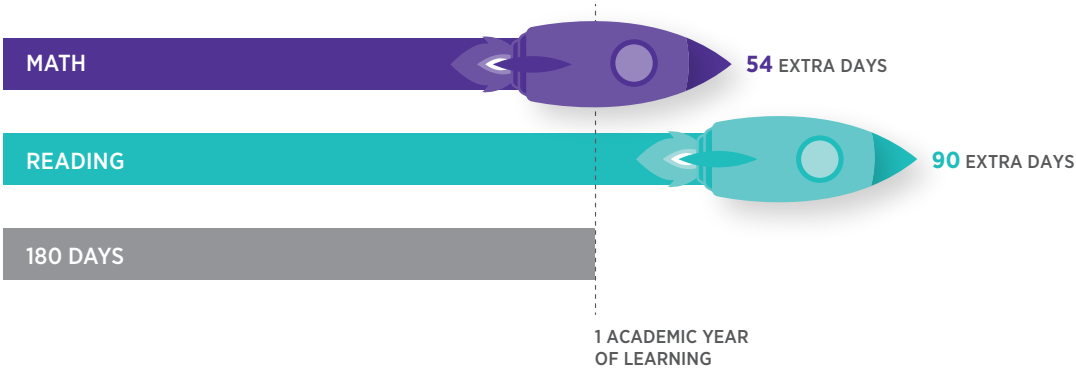

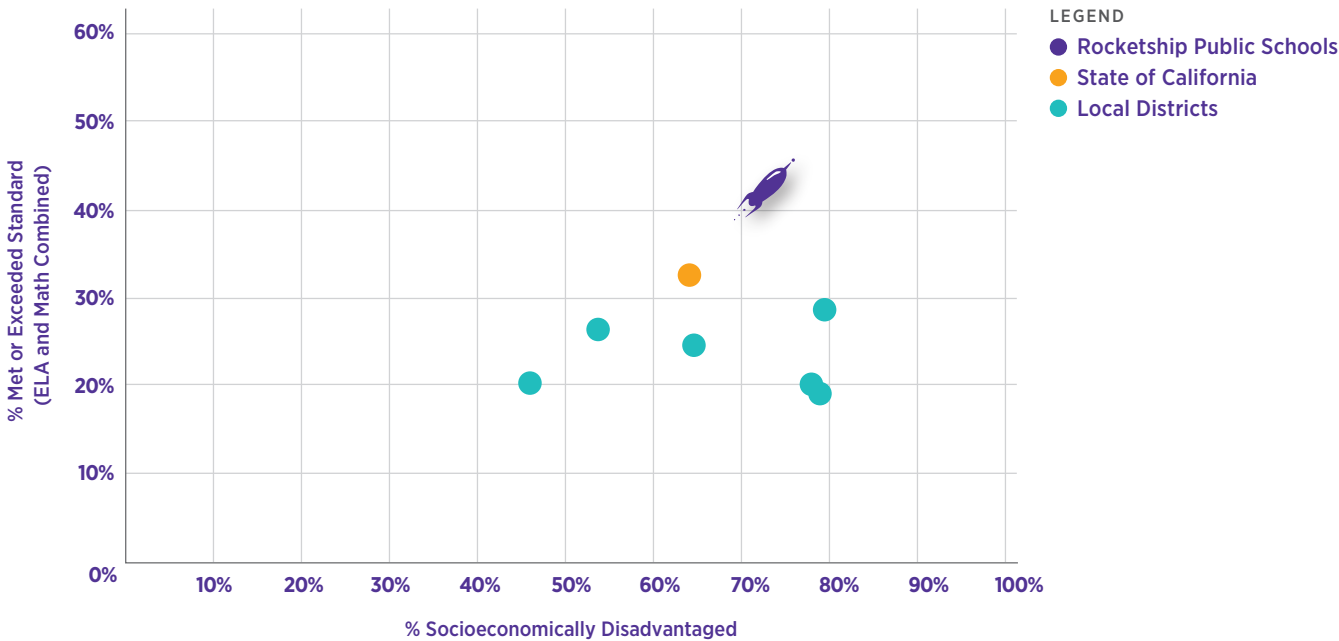

This analysis underscores how our Rocketeers are charting a new course for disadvantaged students in our state. Our high-quality schools and instructional model are proving that demographics do not define the amazing potential of the Rocketeers we have the privilege to serve.

Top Schools in California

In the 2024-25 school year, five of our schools were named Top Schools by Innovate Public Schools for closing opportunity gaps and helping more students reach grade-level standards in math and reading. Congratulations to Rocketship Alma Academy, Rocketship Rising Stars Academy, Rocketship Futuro Academy, Rocketship Brilliant Minds, and Rocketship Los Sueños Academy! Two schools—Rocketship Mosaic Elementary and Rocketship Spark Academy—also made the 2024 Honor Roll by the Educational Results Partnership.

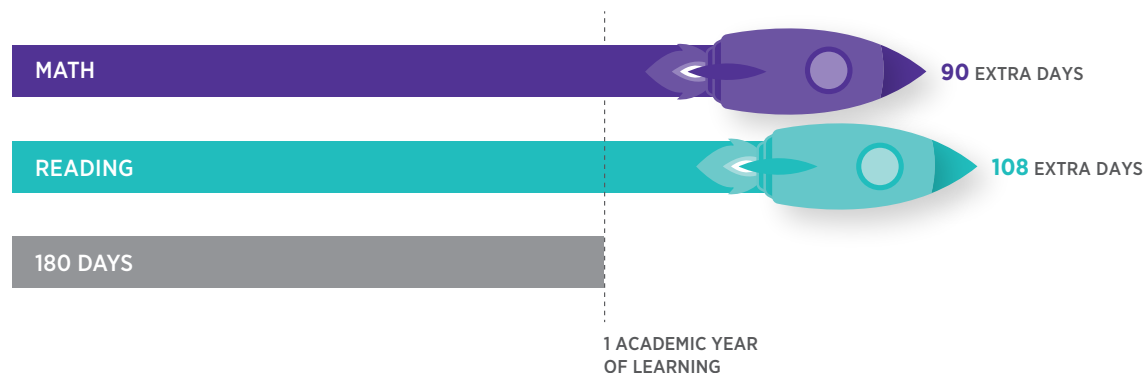


ROCKETSHIP PUBLIC SCHOOLS WISCONSIN

In 2013, Rocketship Wisconsin launched the largest charter school in the history of Milwaukee: Rocketship Southside Community Prep. In 2018, we launched our second school, Rocketship Transformation Prep. In August of 2025, Carmen Schools of Technology and Science's Stellar Elementary joined Rocketship Public Schools Wisconsin, marking our third campus in Milwaukee and first new school acquisition across the Rocketship national network. As we expand our impact in Wisconsin, this moment reflects the strength of our scalable and sustainable public school model.

Wisconsin Rocketeers Are Soaring

On the NWEA MAP assessments, Wisconsin Rocketeers achieved 1.5 years of growth in math and 1.6 years of growth in reading.



Rocketship Wisconsin achieved extraordinary academic gains in 2024-25 school year—some of the strongest the region has seen since launching over a decade ago.

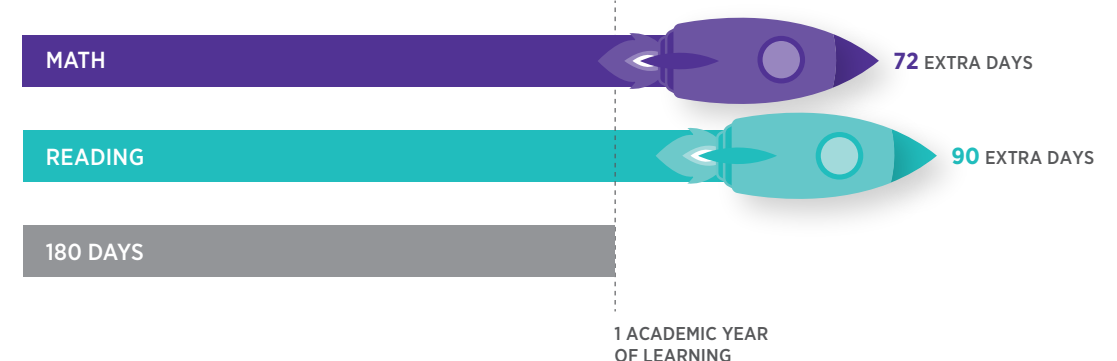

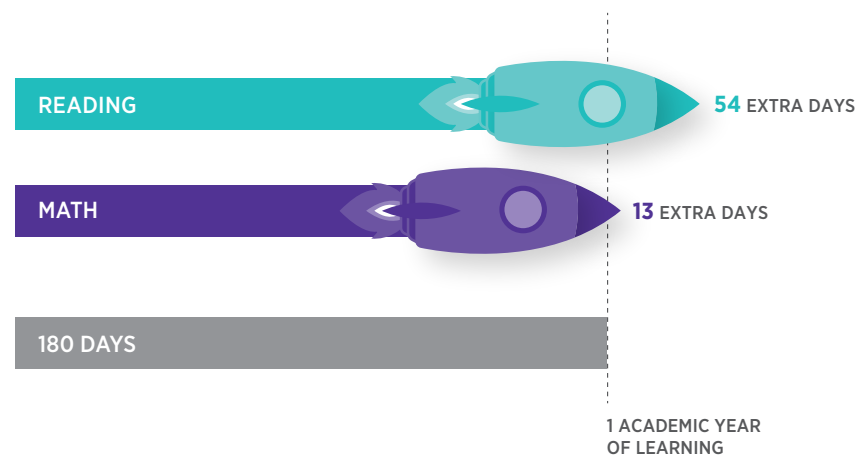

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Leading the Way in Growth

In Tennessee, student progress is measured through the Tennessee Value-Added Assessment System (TVAAS)—a statewide metric that looks beyond test scores to show how much students grow academically each year, regardless of where they start. A higher TVAAS score means students are making more progress than their peers across the state.

This year, Rocketship Dream Community Prep and Rocketship United Academy both earned the highest possible TVAAS rating—Level 5—representing significant above-average growth. Rocketship Nashville Northeast Elementary also earned a Level 4 in reading, reflecting strong gains across the board.

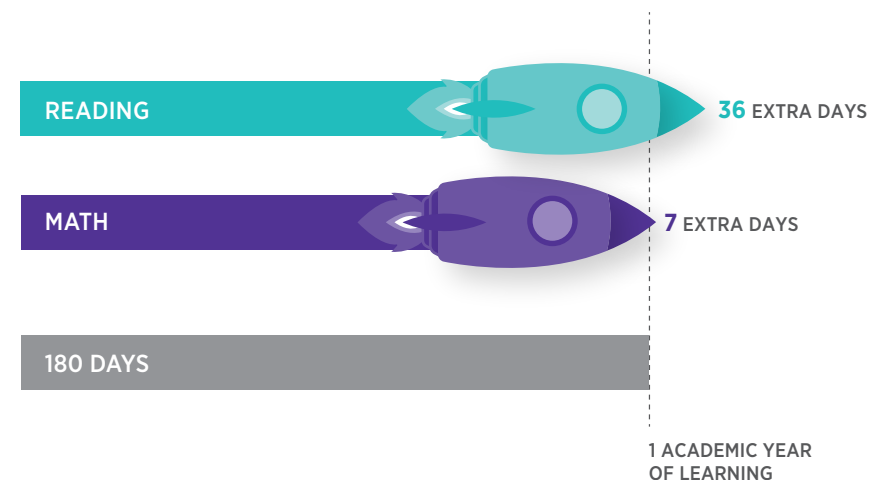


ROCKETSHIP PUBLIC SCHOOLS WASHINGTON DC

In 2016, Rocketship Rise Academy opened in Southeast DC's Ward 8 as the largest charter opening in DC history. Rocketship Legacy Prep opened in Ward 7 a year later. In their very first year, both schools achieved Tier 1 status — the highest ranking for DC Public Charter Schools. In August 2020, in the midst of the pandemic, Rocketship Infinity Community Prep opened its doors as our third school in DC. Partnering with AppleTree Institute to provide high-quality pre-K education, we serve more than a thousand Rocketeers every day—students who have the potential to be DC's next leaders and creative thinkers.

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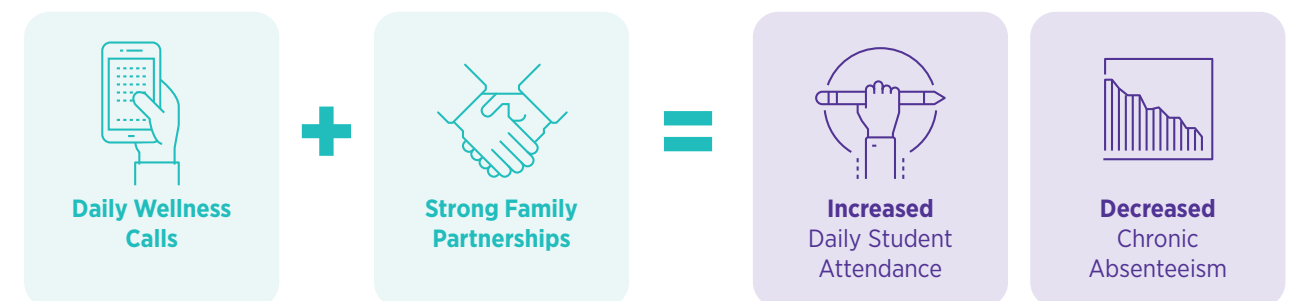
Showing Up Together: Rebuilding Attendance Through Community

Every day at **Rocketship DC** is a gateway to possibility—and our educators and families are showing up for it together.

Chronic absenteeism surged during the pandemic—and in D.C., it remains a pressing challenge for public schools today. In response, Rocketship DC made attendance a strategic priority—because consistent learning is foundational to student success. With the support of our community, our three schools doubled down on daily wellness and attendance calls, reinvested in meaningful family engagement, and deepened partnerships with local organizations to provide critical wraparound services that support students and families.

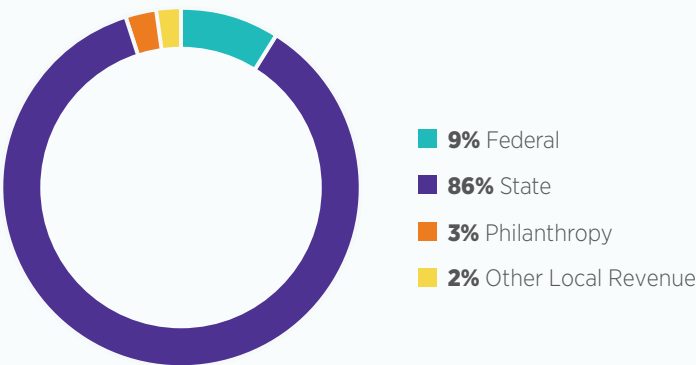
Financials

Rocketship is building a scalable and financially sustainable non-profit school model that propels student achievement in underserved communities across the country. In 2024-25, 95% of our funding came from public sources. School-based expenses accounted for 84% of our spending.

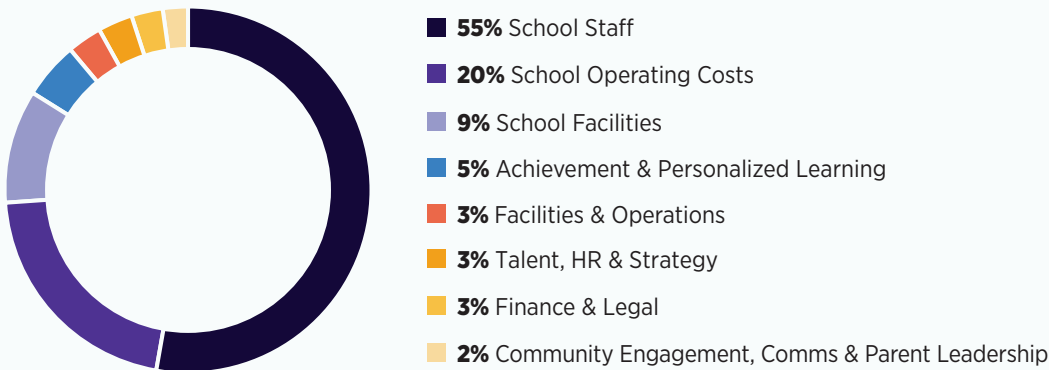
Financial Sustainability

Fully enrolled schools reach financial sustainability by their fifth year of operation. Each region is financially sustainable once it operates between three to eight schools. Our California region was our first fully sustainable region, meaning that our 13 schools and the regional team supporting them operate solely on public funds. Tennessee, home to three campuses, is now our second sustainable region. While we’re proud to continue to drive toward financial sustainability, philanthropic support remains critical to our ability to innovate and expand our impact.
